2017-2018 BUDGET RECAP

During the 2017—2018 school year I proudly served as treasurer for the New York Alpha Chapter of Phi Delta Theta at Cornell University. In this role as treasurer, I worked closely with an outside accountant at Sciarabba Walker in Ithaca to manage the finances of the fraternity. Together, we used expenditures from past years combined with input from brothers to create a budget that will allow us to, at worst, break even financially for the year and, at best, have a profit that can be put into reserves and used for future house projects.

We have organized our budget into categories with brotherhood, chapter, social, and recruitment being a few examples. These categories make it significantly easier to be aware of where we stand financially at any given time.

The main change the chapter made this year monetarily was to increase our social budget. This allowed for more opportunities to mix with sororities and to host recruitment events that would give potential new members a better opportunity to learn about our chapter and visit our house. In order to make up for the increased social budget, we slightly decreased other budgets based on how much we spent categorically in prior years.

I am happy to say that it has been another great year for the New York Alpha Chapter!
