Major Updates Were Completed at 2 Ridgewood Road

Seasons greetings! I want to take this opportunity to give a quick update on some of the great work that has been accomplished since the previous Cayugan. The chapter was not occupied by brothers over the summer because of the amount of construction and renovation taking place. We were able to get the house "fully sprinklered" in compliance with Cornell's fraternity recognition mandate well ahead of the 2013 deadline, and we were able to achieve this without incurring additional debt, thanks in no small part to the generous donations of our alumni. Michael West '05 handled coordinating with the contractors on this project, and it went off without a hitch.

In addition to the important sprinkler project, we were able to take the opportunity of a vacant house to tackle some much-needed upkeep items. First, the carpeting throughout the residential section of the house (hallways and bedrooms) was replaced top to bottom. Second, the walls in the bedrooms, stairwells, and hallways in the residential section were washed and repainted, and the floor boards were repaired as needed. Both of these projects were significant undertakings because of needing to relocate all the furniture from the rooms to the Great Hall for the duration of the projects, and then get it all back into the rooms upon completion. A big thank you to Mark Kendall '04 for his significant coordination efforts with respect to these two projects. I'd also like to thank the undergraduates for their collective generosity in helping make these projects possible.

Finally we've engaged with a new cleaning service in a joint-funded initiative between the undergraduates and the housing corporation to keep the 2 Ridgewood Road looking in tip-top shape. This service is meant to supplement the periodic

cleaning that the undergraduates do on a responsible and regular basis. I'm hoping this will help to address keeping the house cleanliness up to exceptional standards that we can all be proud of year round.

As always, I would like to thank everyone for continuing to support our chapter on an annual basis even through these challenging economic times. We perpetually have a backlog of items, maintenance, and enhancements that we try to address as funding permits. Our chapter house is a crucial part of our collective fraternity experience, and we all have fond memories of our time living there. It takes a great many resources to keep it running year after year. We couldn't do it without you, and your ongoing support is greatly appreciated!



As always, academics continue to be a focal point of the chapter's success. Thanks to the generosity of NYAEFI, a second major upgrade to the computer-room facilities




The brothers of NY Alpha are confident that we will be able to bring the semester to a successful close, and carry over the momentum of our achievements this year into the future.

Phi Delts Are on the Road to Victory!


